San Diego to Anza-Borrego

Head east from the sunny beaches to reach surreal desert landscapes

nza-Borrego Desert State Park bares its desert soul at The Slot. The twisting canyon's siltstone walls reveal the landscape dissected, the earth's crust sliced open by time and water. A stroll through this buff-colored canyon will inspire you to explore much more of San Diego County and Anza-Borrego.

To get there, meander through San Diego's eastern outback. Twenty minutes from downtown, stop at Mission Trails Regional Park, where an architecturally striking visitor center offers exhibits on Kumeyaay Indian life, and the Cowles Mountain Trail delivers a 360-degree city view. Farther east on Interstate 8, go see El Cajon's off-the-radar gems. Relive the 19th-century Old West at the Olaf Wieghorst Museum, its walls lined with horse and cowboy paintings. Savor an hour at Summers Past Farms—sip tea among the spring-blooming sweet peas, relax on the patio, or shop for herbal soaps and garden art.

Push east to **Alpine** for an unforgettable raptor experience. At Sky Falconry, a magnificent Harris's hawk will land softly on your gloved hand. Afterward, satisfy your hunger with a halfpound burger underneath the antler chandeliers at Janet's Montana Cafe, then interact with the animals at Lions Tigers & Bears, a big cat and exotic animal rescue facility.

Wind north on scenic Highway 79 to Cuyamaca Rancho State Park, where 130 miles



of trails wait to be explored. Bag the summit of 5,730-foot Stonewall Peak for a sweeping view that takes in Mount San Gorgonio, Mount San Jacinto, and the Salton Sea.

End your day in the applerich mining town of **Julian**. Sample the famous butterycrust pies at Mom's Pie House, Julian Pie Company, or Apple Alley. Tuck in at the old-world Julian Gold Rush Hotel, then join Eagle Mining Co. for a morning tour of the Eagle and High Peak Mine to learn about Julian's 1870s Gold Rush.

Afterward, make a dramatic descent from the mountains on Banner Grade's tight curlicues, losing 4,000 feet in elevation. Once you've reached **Anza-Borrego Desert State Park** near Borrego Springs, head straight to The Slot. Squeeze through its narrow walls, walk under its gravity-defying arch, and shoot endless photos in this surreal desert canyon.

Snack stop: In Santa Ysabel, try the specialty breads—like date nut raisin and jalapeño cheese—at Dudley's Bakery.

Spiny flora: Drive Old Kane Spring Road off Hwy. 78 to see Anza-Borrego's Cactus Garden with nine different species.



Desert wow: Go offroading in luxury with California Overland Desert Excursions Jeep tours in Anza-Borrego.



Classic Southern California Tour

Enjoy craft beer, whale watching, hiking, and ocean views

f craft beer is king in San Diego County, Stone Brewing World Bistro and Gardens is the royal palace. The Escondido bistro is more than an IPA mecca—it's an oasis of lush gardens and farm-to-table food. Follow this horseshoe-shaped trip to find sunny beaches, relaxed wineries, and two theme parks before reaching Stone's sudsy paradise.

If you've just landed in San Diego and need a snack, go to Liberty Public Market, which offers a smorgasbord of flavors under one roof. Taste empanadas, artisan cheese, and brown-sugar popcorn from more than 30 vendors. Head to nearby SeaWorld San Diego to ride aquatic-themed coasters and learn about marine life, then keep with that theme at La Jolla Cove, where you can watch sea lions bask in the sun. For an upclose look, select a vessel at La Jolla Kayak, or pay a few bucks at The Cave Store and descend a wooden staircase to a sea cave.

Enjoy ocean views as you

head north on Highway 101 to **Carlsbad**, where kids will love LEGOLAND California's The LEGO Movie World, complete with a Unikitty-themed ride. Make a reservation at Jeune et Jolie, where the French-Cali dishes are as pretty as the Art Deco-inspired decor.

The next morning, head up Interstate 5 to **Dana Point** (aka the Dolphin and Whale Watching Capital of the World) and spend the day with Dana Wharf Sportfishing & Whale Watching. For a one-of-a-kind experience, book the Curlew, a 1920s classic schooner complete with two staterooms and a dining saloon.

Once your land legs return, kiss the ocean goodbye and venture east on State Route 74. Fill your pockets with old-fashioned treats at Ortega Oaks Candy Store in **Lake Elsinore** before taking the trailhead across the street to Ortega Falls, which flows spring through fall.

Continuing east, you'll spot shimmering Lake Elsinore before turning south on Interstate

Route 78: Explore more Hops Highway hot spots like Ebullition Brew Works, Belching Beaver, and Iron Fist Brewing.

15 into **Temecula Valley**. Sleep among the vines at the Ponte Vineyard Inn, which sits within walking distance to three wineries. Wake up and head south on I-15 to **Stone Brewing** where you'll taste brews and explore the lovely one-acre grounds.

Kid-Friendly Adventure

Visit theme parks, beaches, and more on this perfect family trip

eople travel from all over the world to visit Southern California's beaches and theme parks, and this family-friendly drive from Los Angeles to Anaheim has epic adventures in both categories and more.

Start your journey at Universal Studios Hollywood's The Secret Life of Pets: Off the Leash, a new experience that travels into a simulated New York City and introduces visitors to 64 animated figures from the movie. Enjoy some of the park's thrill rides based on movie magic, such as Harry Potter and the Forbidden Journey and Jurassic World—The Ride, and don't miss The World-Famous Studio Tour to go behind the scenes at the working lot.

Leaving Universal, you'll find different types of amusement around **Los Angeles**. The fun is more old-fashioned at Griffith Park's Travel Town Museum, where everyone loves the miniature train rides. Then again, who doesn't love dinosaurs? In Exposition Park at the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County's Dinosaur Hall, see a trio of T-Rex skeletons and even touch a 65-million-year-old triceratops fossil.

Continue south into Orange County and catch a wave in **Huntington Beach** (aka Surf City USA) during lessons with Corky Carroll's Surf School. Afterward, grab a bite at Huntington Beach Pier, where choices range from poke tacos at Duke's Huntington Beach to classic burgers at Ruby's Diner.



Then go for more seaside fun and an iconic treat at **Newport Beach's Balboa Island**, birthplace of Balboa Bars, a slab of ice cream on a stick that's dipped in chocolate and smothered with toppings. Chill out some more with skating at **Irvine**'s Great Park Ice, which offers equipment rentals and lessons. If you'd rather leave the double axels to the pros, dig into tacos or flatbread pizzas at Between the Rinks, a restaurant with tables overlooking the ice.

Budget plenty of time in Anaheim at Disneyland Resort's two theme parks to experience all the classic rides and to check out the newer attractions, like Star Wars: Galaxy's Edge, the 14-acre land that embraces the best of the iconic movie series. Before you arrive, download the Disneyland app to find out wait times, access the time-saving MaxPass, order food, and even track down strolling characters during your visit.



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

L.A. to Big Bear Lake

Explore urban gems en route to a mountain escape

nowflakes and ski hills lure **Big Bear**'s winter visitors, but the rest of the year, this Southern California alpine getaway is prime for hiking, biking, and lakefront fun. Big Bear's 6,750-foot elevation offers big benefits-cool temps, a shoreline rimmed with pines, and dozens of trails. Hike up Castle Rock Trail for close encounters with massive granite boulders and peeks at the lake, or mountain bike along Skyline Trail's vista-filled single-track. Work up a sweat, then cool off with a swim around China Island.

Big Bear is located just a few hours east of Los Angeles International Airport, and this itinerary features some fascinating attractions en route. Stop along the way in **Pasadena**, where you can park your car and walk from one museum to another. See works by Rodin. Rembrandt, and Renoir at the Norton Simon Museum, discover Finnish folk art at the Pasadena Museum of History, and tour prizewinning American Arts and Crafts architecture at the Gamble House. Across town at the Huntington Library, stroll 120 acres of meticulous gardens, then go indoors to view rare books and art.

Head a few miles east to pick up your own rare and common cacti or succulents at the California Cactus Center in East Pasadena, then continue on to **Arcadia**, where you can wander the Los Angeles County Arboretum's paths feature freeroaming peacocks, a waterfall, and the cottage made famous by the TV series *Fantasy Island*.

Back on the freeway, cut south to the college town of **Claremont.** Sample duck tacos and grilled pears at Bardot, then drop into the Claremont Museum of Art to view Millard Sheets' colorful California landscapes. In nearby **Ontario**, get schooled on all things California at the California Welcome Center, then linger for browsing at Ontario Mills' 200-plus shops.

Continue a few miles into San Bernardino County to **Redlands**, a city built on citrus. Sweet navel oranges fostered vast Victorian wealth, grandly displayed in ornate "Marmalade Mansions." Tour the 1897 Kimberly Crest House, a French chateau with formal Italian gardens, then sample Hangar 24 Brewery's orange wheat beer.

Departing Redlands, snake through a twisty ascent on postcard-vista roads to **Big Bear Lake.** Sleep in comfort at The Club at Big Bear Village, then zip over to Boulder Bay for a morning kayak paddle.

Go for a cruise: Hop on the Lake Arrowhead Queen, then soak in a tub at Lake Arrowhead Resort and Spa.






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Monterey to Channel Islands National Park

Natural wonders abound on this Central Coast journey

oad trips don't usually end on islands. But just a short boat ride away from Ventura or Oxnard, the pristine beaches and rolling hills of **Channel Islands** National Park await. Starting in **Monterey**, this trip ranges inland before returning to the ocean, with amusement park rides for the kids, wine tastings for adults, and plenty of beauty for everyone along the way.

See playful otters and a 28-foot-tall kelp forest tank at the Monterey Bay Aquarium. Then play at Gilroy Gardens, the horticultural theme park where rides offer younger kids just the right thrill. Snake into a forest on the Timber Twister Coaster or glide through a greenhouse on the Sky Trail Monorail.

There are more rides, including a double-deck carousel, at Hollister's Casa de Fruta, a farm stand that grew into a can't-miss destination for its dried fruit and fresh-baked pies. In San Luis Obispo, stay at the eclectic Madonna Inn in themed rooms, such as the grotto-like

Caveman suite (complete with a bathroom waterfall).

Explore the nearby Pismo State Beach Monarch Butterfly Grove, where thousands of black-and-orange beauties congregate from October to February. Break up the drive in Los Alamos, a sleepy ranching town just off U.S. 101 that has emerged as a culinary destination; Bell's is the place for California-inspired French bistro cuisine.

Farther south, climb along chaparral-covered slopes to sweeping panoramas from 2.458-foot Gaviota Peak at Gaviota State Park. When it's time to fuel up, head to Santa Barbara's La Super-Rica Taqueria, the landmark (and cash-only) stand where tacos prepared with freshly made corn tortillas and such classics as chile rellenos keep lines perpetually long. Worth the wait? Definitely.

In Ventura, get into the spirit of your upcoming adventure with steamed clams and harbor views at Brophy Bros. Seafood & Clam Bar. Channel Islands

See a masterpiece: Experi-


ence the splendors of Hearst Castle, where tours lead through the opulent rooms and suites.

Scenic vista: Take in the craggy volcanic spires of Pinnacles National Park along the High Peaks Trail.

History lesson: Mission San Miguel is notable for its

Fresno to Fairfield

Find a variety of treats on this colorful Central Valley drive

rives don't get more colorful than this trip from the sweet-smelling orchards along the Fresno Blossom Trail to the rainbowhued candies at Fairfield's Jelly Belly California factory.

Fly into Fresno Yosemite International Airport for easy access to Sequoia & Kings Canyon National Parks, Yosemite National Park, and the Central Valley highlights on this tour. First, head to the **Fresno Blossom Trail** for a burst of fragrance through the orchards of stone fruit, citrus, and apples. The bloom peaks in February and March, but throughout the year you can pick up produce at Simonian Farms and the trail's other farm stands.

Head northwest on Highway 99 to explore wetlands and look for tule elk, migrating waterfowl, and San Joaquin kit foxes on auto tours and nature trails at San Luis National Wildlife Refuge. For a look at the history of the Central Valley, the Great Valley Museum in **Modesto** has exhibits on five different local habitats, as well as collections of Yokut and Miwok Indian artifacts. Planetarium shows on Saturdays transport visitors into the distant reaches of outer space.

Continue north on 99 and stop at Midgley's Public House in **Stockton** for a hearty bowl of French onion soup or prime rib sliders. For dessert, continue to Michael David Winery in **Lodi**, which draws visitors for not only its burly Zinfandels, but also a café and bakery that serves pies baked with a family recipe



Explore more of California's crops at the UC Davis Arboretum and Public Garden, where three different mile-long loops lead through collections of native plants and species. Save the sweets for last and venture southeast on Interstate 80 to reach Fairfield's Jelly Belly Candy Company. At the factory, three different tours show how these colorful treats are made (and include free samples). Combine beans to find your favorite new flavor combination and buy a pack for the road at the Jelly Belly Candy Store.





Walk break: Explore the Delta, California's "Inland Coast," along trails at Big Break Regional Shoreline park.

Scenic vista: Climb to a plateau at Rockville Hills Regional Park for commanding views of the 3,848-foot Mount Diablo.

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

Bay Area Culinary Tour

Taste your way from Oakland to the heart of wine country

his tour begins in the Bay Area, moves north through the farmlands of Marin County, and hits hot spots in Sonoma County and Napa Valley, with good bites and slurps at every turn.

Start in **Oakland** at the Ordinaire Wine Shop & Wine Bar to sample a dizzying selection of Sonoma's organic wines and cheeses. Then cross the Bay Bridge to **San Francisco**, where The Presidio has 1,500 acres of waterfront parklands with museums, hiking trails, and the Inn at the Presidio, with its daily wine-and-cheese reception for guests. Eat at the Presidio Social Club and sip from its robust regional wine list.

Drive the famed Highway 101 across the Golden Gate Bridge into the farmlands of **Marin** and **Sonoma**. When you see cows, it means you're in California cheese country. Pass **Novato** and skip onto side roads for samples and a picnic at the Marin French Cheese Co., founded in 1865. Continue north to **Petaluma** and order a pint at HenHouse Brewing Company before continuing east to grab an irresistible ham biscuit at Lou's Luncheonette in **Sonoma**.

In **Yountville**, stock up on Nutter Butters and OhOhs at Thomas Keller's Bouchon Bakery, secure artisanal provisions of all sorts at Oakville Grocery, and then order your burger of choice at the iconic Gott's Roadside in **St. Helena**.

Head north to Francis Ford Coppola Winery in **Geyserville**, where you can choose from a variety of regular or reserve tastings, take a dip in the outdoor pool on a hot summer day, or even go on a vineyard scavenger hunt around the picturesque hilltop grounds. If you still have room for a meal, try the excellent on-site Italian restaurant, then check out an exhibit on the director's films and play a round of backgammon or bocce surrounded by landscaped lawns.

Relax overnight at the nearby Geyserville Inn, where bright, airy rooms overlook the vineyards and forested hills of Sonoma. With tasting rooms in Creative break: Visit the museums, gardens, and venues in Berkeley's cultural heart the Downtown Arts District.

Shuck oysters: Buy a bucket of the famous local product to shuck at the Tomales Bay Oyster Company.

Open-air shopping: Check out Sebastopol's The Barlow, a



marketplace with cool breweries, unique shops, and galleries.

San Francisco to the North Coast

Expect scenic stops along the ruggedly beautiful coastline

ith its lush forest and dramatic sea cliffs, the destination-worthy **Patrick's Point State Park** is one of the most ruggedly romantic square miles in the state—and it beckons couples to tie the knot here on its aptly named Wedding Rock.

Let the park's crashing waves call you northward from **San Francisco**. Start your journey at Lands End, where you can hike along a coastal trail to spot offshore shipwrecks and ruins of the Sutro Baths. Stop in the swanky Cliff House for panoramic views served alongside Bloody Marys, before driving across the Golden Gate Bridge.

Snake along the protected coastline of Point Reyes National Seashore before stopping in **Marshall** for local oysters, served bubbling hot off the barbecue at Nick's Cove. Next, cut east through Sonoma County to **Healdsburg**. Window shop and sip your way through the historic downtown, stopping by intimate tasting rooms like Selby Winery, Banshee Wines, and Siduri.

Continue along Highway 101 and State Route 128 to The Bewildered Pig in **Philo**. This perfectly out-of-the-way foodie mecca serves a prix fixe tasting menu highlighted by locally foraged vegetables and herbs. Jump back in the car to find your resting spot 30 minutes north at the elegant Little River Inn, overlooking the Van Damme State Park beach.

The next morning, spend a few hours strolling through Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens in **Fort Bragg**. The 2.5-mile trail loops through manicured gardens and wildflower fields. Continue north as Highway 1 curves away from the coast, leaving beach scrub for giant sequoias. Enjoy the tunnel of green through groves of 2,000-year-old trees.

After a forest-filled drive, Ferndale's colorful Victorian village will surprise and delight. In the 1850s, Danish immigrants created a bustling dairy industry, using their fortunes to

build what locals call "butterfat palaces." Marvel at wraparound porches and gingerbread trims before heading to your final destination, 47 miles north. Reserve a campground to enjoy the full **Patrick's Point** experience ending the day with a sunset over the rocky outcroppings and starting a morning surrounded by birdsong.

Sacramento to Hetch Hetchy Valley

Gold Rush history and Yosemite's expansive wilderness await

n Hetch Hetchy Valley in Yosemite National Park, sheer granite cliffs and domes frame an eightmile-long lake, its edges graced by gushing cataracts. Hetch Hetchy Reservoir's most important job is supplying 2.7 million Californians with drinking water, but nature lovers are drawn to its pristine meadows and quiet backcountry trails.

Take advantage of the flourishing coffee scene in Sacramento and fuel up with a Temple Coffee pour-over or a Chocolate Fish nitro flash brew to start your journey. Sweep through Highway 16's rolling grasslands to join Highway 49 winding south to **Sutter Creek**. Browse Fine Eye Gallery for one-of-a-kind jewelry, and watch artists transform molten glass into vases at Chaos Glassworks. Get a blacksmithing lesson at Knight Foundry, a relic from mining days. Rest up at the elegant Hanford House Inn. then move on to Jackson in the morning. Tour the Kennedy Gold Mine

to learn how 1800s miners extracted gold from hard rock. Lunch on a goat cheese salad or lamb burger at farm-to-fork Rosebud's Cafe, then push south on 49, slowing down for the Mokelumne River canyon's tight curves.

East of Angels Camp, stretch your legs with a walk to Natural Bridges, a limestone cave you can swim through, or explore the magnificent underground world at Moaning Caverns. Proceed to Jamestown, where Railtown 1897 State Historic Park offers excursion rides on steam locomotives. A long, zig-zagging ascent up Highway 120 brings you to Groveland. Poke into the Iron Door Saloon, California's oldest continuously operating bar, its ceiling covered in crumpled dollar bills. Then drive out to Rainbow Pool for a dip in the Tuolumne River's chilly waters.

Cruise north to Yosemite's Hetch Hetchy entrance and stroll across O'Shaughnessy Dam's concrete crest. On the

dam's far side, a two-mile trail traces the shoreline to boisterous Wapama Falls, roaring with spring snowmelt.

After a hike in Hetch Hetchy, a microbrew will hit the spot, so backtrack to Evergreen Lodge. With a cabin here or at sister property Rush Creek Lodge, you can roast s'mores and stay up late to admire the stars.

Exploring Shasta Cascade's Wonders

Uncover the treasures of this remote, magical region

mighty snow-capped volcano—14,179 feet high and 17 miles wide—reigns over Northern California. The largest stratovolcano in the Cascade Range, Mount Shasta's massive cone can be seen from 150 miles away—and this trip takes you right to it.

Starting in **Sacramento**, venture north on Highway 99 to **Yuba City**, where the jagged outline of the Sutter Buttes marks the smallest mountain range in the world. Fuel up with a Cubano and blue-cheese fries at Justin's Kitchen, then drive around the Buttes' eroded lava domes—you can circle the entire range in an hour. (Or join a guided hike with Middle Mountain Foundation.)

Ramble north toward **Grid**ley, driving through Gray Lodge Wildlife Area to see thousands of snow geese and waterfowl in fall and winter. From May to July, walk Lavender Ranch's fragrant purple flower fields. Keep spinning north to **Chico**'s Sierra Nevada Brewery, a pioneer in California's craft beer revolution. Tour the sleek, eco-friendly brew house, then hike or bike along Big Chico Creek Canyon in Bidwell Park. Don't leave town without splurging at Shubert's Ice Cream & Candy, Chico's sweet spot for handmade chocolates and peanut brittle.

Twenty minutes north in tiny **Vina**, Trappist-Cistercian monks welcome guests to New Clairvaux Vineyard. Sip Syrah and Tempranillo handcrafted by monks and supervised by Aimée Sunseri, a fifth-generation California winemaker.

Two more hours on the road takes you past Lassen Volcanic National Park to **Old Station**. Explore underground at Subway Cave, a pitch-black tunnel formed by a 20,000-year-old lava flow. Veer north on Highway 89, then pull over at **McArthur-Burney Falls Memorial State Park** to see 129-foot-high

Burney Falls.

Keep winding north to the upscale logging town of **Mc-Cloud**, where plush beds await



at the McCloud Mercantile Hotel. In the morning, ascend to 7,900 feet on Mount Shasta via the vista-filled Everitt Memorial Highway from downtown **Mt. Shasta City**. Hike the Horse Camp Trail amid mountain wildflowers or go snowshoeing at Bunny Flat.

Lake Tahoe to Gold Country

Discover alpine fun and underground wonders

wo hundred feet below the surface in California Gold Country, the auditorium-sized chambers of Black Chasm Cavern hold a rare treasure trove of glittering crystals, spiky stalactites, and North America's largest display of twisting, curling, glass-like helictite formations. This natural wonder is literally a hidden gem, a worthwhile conclusion to a road trip of discovery from Lake Tahoe through the hills and valleys of central California.

Starting at an elevation of 6,200 feet on the shores of **South Lake Tahoe**, explore the inlets and beaches by boat or kayak, then soar upward in a gondola at Heavenly to zip-line and climb at its Epic Discovery Park (summer only). Make your base the convenient Hotel Becket, gobble up fish tacos and local ales lakeside at Riva Grill, then hit the road, taking Highway 50 winding westward through the Sierra Nevada.

Sample the fresh bounty of California's farm-to-fork heartland at some of the 50 familyrun farms and wineries of Apple Hill Growers near Placerville (check in advance for seasonal openings). Nearby, stay at the homey Ponderosa Ridge A Bed & Breakfast, overlooking a threeacre orchard. See the creative uses for all this produce at The Farm Table Restaurant (try the homemade sausages or turkeypumpkin panini). Get dessert at the Hangman's Tree Ice Cream Saloon next door, underneath an outlaw hanging from the façade of the historic structure.

Across the rolling hills of Highway 49 about 30 minutes south, the emerging wine country of **Amador County** has 45 wineries as of yet escaping the tourist crowds of Napa. Sample wines in the scenic tasting room of the 50-year-old Terra d'Oro Winery in **Plymouth**, then stop by the Iron Hub Winery to fuel your trip onward with wine and soup pairings.

Dive into 19th-century Gold Rush history along Highway 49 at Kennedy Gold Mine and the Amador County Museum near Jackson. But even the gleam of gold can't compare to nature's million-year-old rock sculptures revealed in tours through Black Chasm Cavern in the hills above Volcano off of Highway 88. This National Natural Landmark includes trails, picnic areas, a sluice-gold-panning activity, and even a monolith-filled Zen Garden. But the real treasure worth the trip is what lies hidden below at your final destination.






